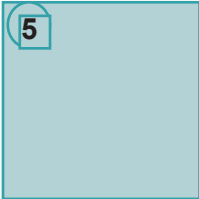

Disposing of used solvent

GLAS Plein Air Painting

2nd & 4th Thursdays of the month 8am for 8.30.
Due to popular demand – we hope to again have a regular informal painting and sketching group. Please note: You should get there early in case we need to change the venue on the day because of the weather or unknown circumstances (bird attacks, feral ducks or something.) Don't forget to bring sun screen, a hat, a chair (if you want one), something to eat and drink – especially water, and anything else you think you might need. No tutor. It would be ideal if individuals paired up so as to avoid turning up by yourself.

March 24: Darawank War memorial Reserve (along the river – Toilets available). Riverscape, variety of trees, wharf, fishers, distant views.

June 9th: Pebbly Beach near new park, Forster (Toilets/some shelter). Dynamic coastal scenery, headlands, surf, gnarly trees.



Arty Tech Talk

In this newsletter I will look at **EDGES**, *The Final Element of design*, that I overlooked last year, (remember these are the basic characteristics of the marks we make with our brushes, pencils, pastels or even chisels to some extent). Edges aren't included in some art schools' lists of design elements but you get that.

Review; When we make a mark, that individual mark can be described in terms of its;

- Tone (or value) which is how light or dark a mark is.
- Shape (roundish, angular, organic, geometric etc)
- Size (big, little, medium etc)
- Colour (hue, temperature, intensity and value – light or dark)
- Direction (horizontal, diagonal, vertical etc)
- Texture (smooth, rough, broken, spotty etc)
- Line (thick, thin, dotted, faded edge – for the watercolourists, etc)
- **AND EDGES**

This last element is often overlooked by some artists and may not be as important in some genres as in others. To the realist or even impressionist landscape artist edges are overlooked at their peril. In landscapes we are mostly concerned with capturing a 3 dimensional image on a 2 dimensional surface. To do this we emulate what the eye sees utilising linear and atmospheric (or aerial) perspective. In atmospheric perspective we need to adhere to what the atmosphere and distance do to our subject (despite what we see in our photo references – they lie!)

Photos taken in auto mode are quite different to what the eye would perceive and some experts claim to be quite adept at detecting a painting done from a photo. Depth of field, white/dark balance, edges and even distance are all mucked about. (Don't forget the Wednesday plein air paint outs!).

Generally over distance; tones lighten, colour intensity fades, colours tend more towards blue (reds fade out) and so get cooler, textures diminish as does detail and objects get smaller and this all means that edges get blurry. Quite simply everything usually gets lighter, bluer and fuzzier. Indeed, some artists spend nearly as much time or more adjusting edges as they do blocking in their shapes. This stage can be viewed as 'pushing and pulling' the features and subjects within your painting ever so minutely to achieve a more realistic 3D presentation. Attending to this stage of your painting process is VITAL or your subject matter may appear extremely flat and stuck on. **So, warm up colours, sharpen and darken your focal area and fade**

out the rest as described and you could make notable progress and whatever you do: don't trust photos!
